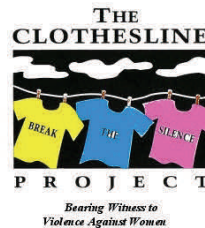
- ◆ Hosted multiple information tables in 6 area libraries and Elgin Community College.

- ◆ Informed 10 YWCA English as a Second Language Classes of their right to a safe home.

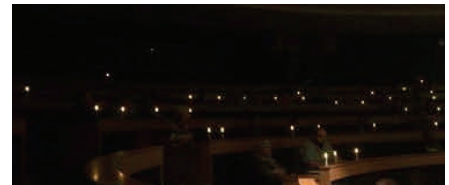
- ◆ Purchased and wore purple shirts for the October 20 Wear a Purple Shirt Day.



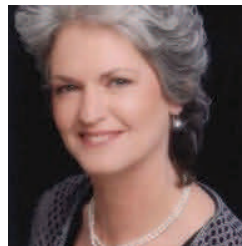
- ◆ Participated with Elgin Community College in the 2 day Clothesline Project .

Impact 100 Chicago Suburban Chapter awarded a \$100,000 grant in June to the Crisis Center. The grant will replace and upgrade our 20 year old telephone

system; purchase a new commercial refrigerator for the shelter kitchen; renovate one of the shelter bedrooms to accommodate a family with a male teen; paint the 7 shelter bedrooms, hallways and stairwells; and install privacy tint on the shelter bedrooms and hallway windows. The phone system will be completed by the end of the year and the remainder of the projects will be done by summer of 2017. **Impact 100 Chicago's** mission is to award membership funded transformational grants to local non-profit organizations while empowering women to improve lives through philanthropy. The Crisis Center is indebted to **Impact 100 Chicago Suburban Chapter** for this generous, amazing award.

Community Crisis Center Programs and Services

Hot line: Available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, the hotline provides information and referral, support, counseling, suicide intervention, and general information to all who call.

Domestic Violence Program: providing information and resources to individuals and families that include emergency shelter; counseling; legal, medical, and welfare advocacy. Emergency response to area hospitals by trained volunteers.

Sexual Assault Program: providing information and resources to victims and their family members/significant others that include counseling; legal and medical advocacy; and emergency response to area hospitals by trained volunteers.

Children's Services: Services provided to children of adult clients include emergency shelter; school and social service agency advocacy; and counseling.

Economic Crisis Program: providing information and resources to individuals and families who lack sufficient shelter, food and support. Services include shelter; counseling; financial assistance; emergency food; outreach to the homeless; and transitional living program

Speakers Bureau and Community Education: presentations are available on a variety of topics suitable for schools, business, churches, clubs, groups and organizations
